Ibero-America is a global partnership that is comprised of twenty-two countries with over 630 million inhabitants, where Spanish or Portuguese are the predominant languages. The partnership includes all Spanish-speaking countries in Latin-America, Spain, Brazil and Portugal. These countries participate in the annual Ibero-American Summit, which has been organised by the Ibero-American Community of Nations since 1991. In addition, they are involved in major regional economic organisations, such as the European Union, NAFTA, the Transpacific Partnership, the Transatlantic Partnership, and MCCA.

A New Political Cycle in Ibero-America?

In this seminar, Professor Manuel Alcántara (University of Salamanca, Spain) will discuss the two periods of political evolution that took place in Latin American countries between 1978 and 2015. He will highlight the institutional, political and economic aspects of these cycles and discuss the possibility of a new political period, beginning in 2016, which is characterised by a trivialization of the democratic process.

The second part of the session will be delivered by Dr Ferran Martínez i Coma, a Spanish researcher at the University of Sydney, who is the founder of the blog "Piedras de Papel" and a contributor to

the Spanish newspaper eldiario.es. He will discuss the recent political and electoral developments in Spain, namely the inability of any political party to form a cabinet following the December 2015 general election and the calling of a second election for June 2016. Dr Ferran Martínez i Coma will provide some key insights that are necessary to understand the current political situation in Spain.

Manuel Alcántara is a professor at the University of Salamanca and the Director of FLACSO Spain since 2014. He has taught courses at several universities, including Georgetown University, Tulane University, Kobe University, Paris III, FLACSO Ecuador, among others. Manuel was the Director of the Institute of Latin America at the University of Salamanca between 1994 and 2007, the Deputy Vice-Chancellor



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of International Relationships and Cooperation from 2007 until 2009, and the Secretary General of the Latin American Association of Political Science between 2002 and 2009. He has been a visiting professor at the University of North Carolina (Chapel Hill) and at the University of Notre Dame. His major publications include *Gobernabilidad*, *crisis y cambio* (Mexico, Fondo de Cultura Económica, 1994), *Politicians and Politics in Latin America* (Boulder. Lynne Rienner Pub, 2008), *South American Legislatures: Thinking about Economic Integration and Defense Policy* (Washington, D.C. CSIS, 2000). In addition, he was appointed Doctor Honoris Causa at the University of San Martin (Argentina).
